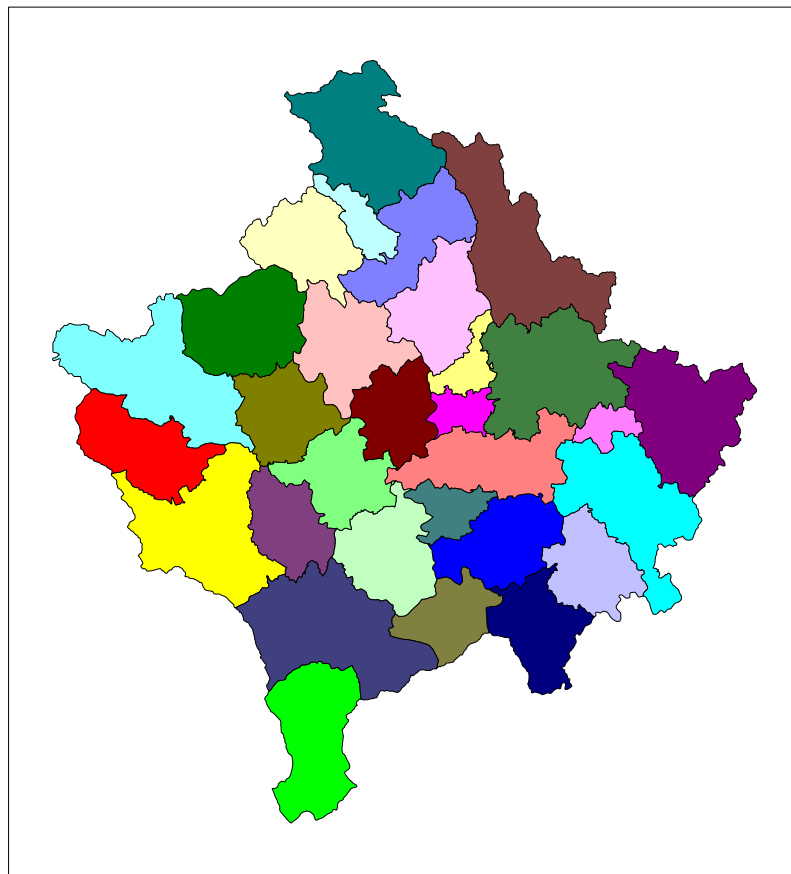

Preface

The External Trade Division has started with publications of Kosovo's Import on 2001. In the beginning the publications were biannual and the figures were based on the Kosovo Customs Service data.

Preliminary Figures on Export from Kosovo has been published for 2000 and 2001. These publications were preliminary and with ongoing quality improvements the figures published in this report are different from the preliminary figures published earlier. Future publications will probably give new figures and better quality.

This report contains 7 tables on Kosovo external trade mainly for 2005 and some comparisons with 2004.

Import is given by country of origin.

Progress is now being made in External Trade Statistics and more accurate data will be provided in the future.

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The flow of export and import in Kosovo during 2005

During 2005 Kosovo had much more import than export, which means that in our country we have negative trade balance, total value of import is 1180 million €, while export is 48,9 million €, where export covers the import with only 4,1%.

In this publication are given more extensively, many clarifications in details, regarding of what our country import from external trade and what exports into external trade.

By comparing the data from 2005 with those from 2004 for some main groups of goods we can see that: the export group of building materials and metals has increased from 21,5 million euro to 24,1 million euro (12,1%), leather and its products from 5,9 million euro to 6,1 million euro (3,4%), foods, beverages and tobacco from 6,5 million euro to 7,8 million euro (20%), minerals, combustibles and electrical power from 2,4 million euro to 3,2 million euro (33,3%).

Whereas the group of exports: Chemical and plastic products has decline from 4,7 million euro to 1,9 million euro (147,4%), machinery, equipments and exchanging equipments from 11,1 million euro to 3,6 million euro (208,3%), textile and footwear from 1,5 million euro to 0,7 million euro (114,3%).

The import group like: Minerals, combustibles and electrical power has increased from 173,1 million euro to 212,3 million euro (22,6%), chemical and plastic products from 140,5 million euro to 142,4 million euro (1,4%), leather and its products from 1,0 million euro to 1,5 million euro (50%), machinery, equipments and exchanging equipments from 167,0 million euro to 244,2 million euro (46,2), textile and footwear from 41,5 million euro to 48,0 million euro (15%). Whereas the group of imports: Foods, beverages and tobacco has decline from 293,2 million euro to 287,5 million euro (2,0%), wood and paper products from 63,3 million euro to 55,7 million euro (13,6%), other goods from 51,3 million euro to 46,1 million euro (11,3%).

The main trade partners for 2005 were Macedonia, Serbia & Montenegro, Germany, Turkey, Italy, Greece, Slovenia and Bulgaria.

The export with Macedonia is 19,7% whereas import is 18,6%, with Serbia & Montenegro export is 14,1 whereas import is 13,9%, export with Germany 6,6% whereas import 11,0%, with Turkey export is 2,1% whereas import is 7,2%, with Italy export is 11,5% whereas import is 4,3, with Greece export is 11,1% whereas 4,0%, with Slovenia export is 2,4% whereas import is 4,7%, and with Bulgaria export is 2,0% whereas import is 3,2%.

During 2005, some of our trade partners, with whom the export and import is increased are respectively Macedonia, Greece, Germany, regarding the export, whereas for import are Macedonia and Germany, the differences with other partners are very small (minimum).

Concepts and definitions

Coverage

International merchandise trade statistics record all goods which add to or subtract the stock of material resources of a country by entering (imports) or leaving (exports) its economic territory. Goods simply being transported through a country (goods in transit) or temporarily admitted or withdrawn (except for goods for inward or outward processing) do not add or subtract from the stock of material resources of a country and are not included in the international merchandise trade statistics. In many cases, a country's economic territory largely coincides with its customs territory, which is the territory in which the customs law of a country applies in full.

Time of recording

Goods are included at the time when they enter or leave the economic territory of a country.

Statistical territory

In international merchandise trade statistics, the objective is to record goods entering or leaving the economic territory of a country. The statistical territory may coincide with the economic territory of a country or with some part of it. It follows that when the statistical territory of a country and its economic (customs) territory differ, international merchandise trade statistics do not provide a complete record of inward and outward flows of goods.

The trade systems

There are two trade systems in common use by which international merchandise trade statistics are compiled:

The general trade system is in use when the statistical territory of a country coincides with its economic territory.

The special trade system is use when the statistical territory comprises only a particular part of the economic territory.

F.O.B. (Free on board)

Delivery term, indicating that the price of the goods includes transport and handing costs to an agreed port of loading.

C.I.F. (Cost, Insurance, Freight)

Delivery term indicating that the price of the goods includes insurance and freight to an agreed port of destination

Commodity classifications

The complex of the basic customs and statistical needs makes necessary to have a rather detailed commodity classifications. The Harmonized commodity description and coding system (Harmonized System, or HS) or extended version based on HS, such as the Combined Nomenclature is based on the nature of the commodity.

Harmonized System (HS 96) contains 5113 subheadings and 1241 headings, grouped into 97 chapters and 21 sections.

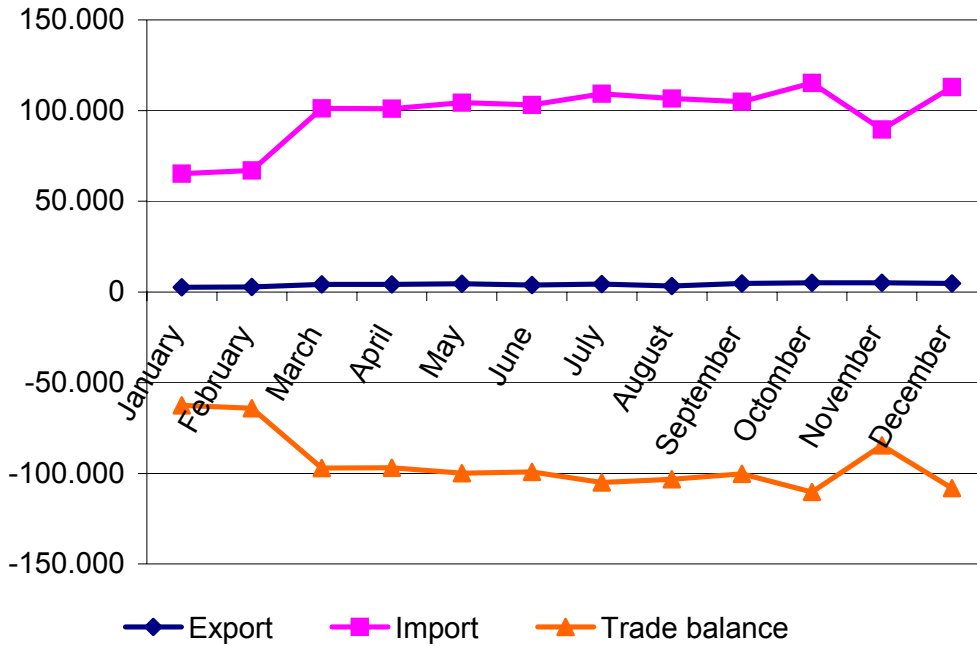
Initial figures for Kosovo's external trade of goods show a net trade deficit of 1131,1 million € for 2005 compared with a deficit of 1006,8 million € for 2004..

Export and Import for 2005 were worth 48,9 million € and 1180 million € respectively.

There is a 15,6% decreased for export and a 11,0% increase for import compared to 2004.

Graph 2: Flow of goods on external trade by quarterly, euro thousand 2004,2005

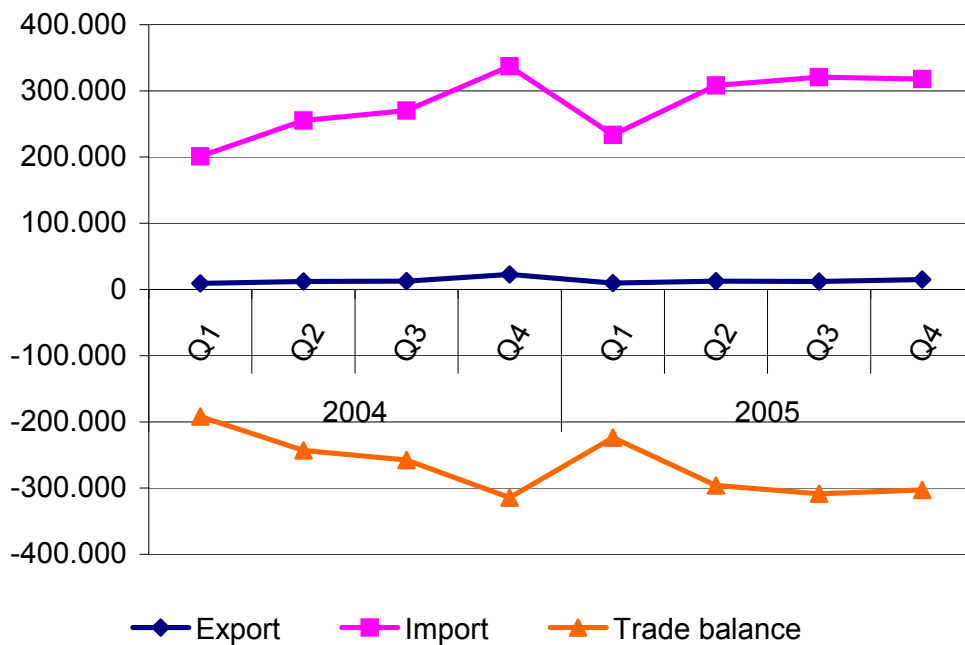

According to the data the main groups of export are: 48,5% base metal and article thereof, 12,5% leather and their articles, 9,3% prepared foodstuffs, beverages and tobacco, 6,6% mineral products, 5,7% vegetable products, 5,5% machinery, appliances and electric material, 2,0% products of chemical industries etc.

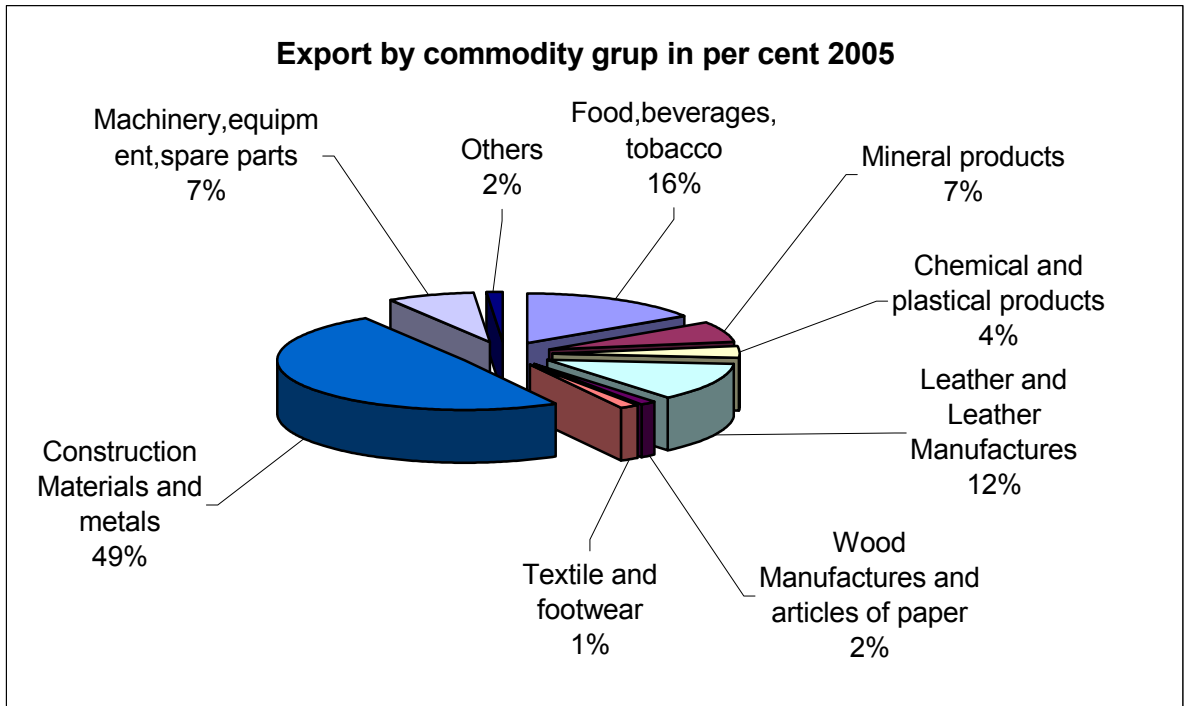

According to the data the main groups of import are: 18,0% mineral products, 14,0% prepared foodstuffs, beverages and tobacco, 11,3% machinery, appliances and electric material, 9,3% transport means, 7,7% base metal and articles of base metal, 4,9 vegetable products, 4,6% live animals and animal, 4,4% articles of stone, plaster, ceramic and glass, 4,3% plastics, rubber and articles thereof, 3,1% textiles and textile articles etc.

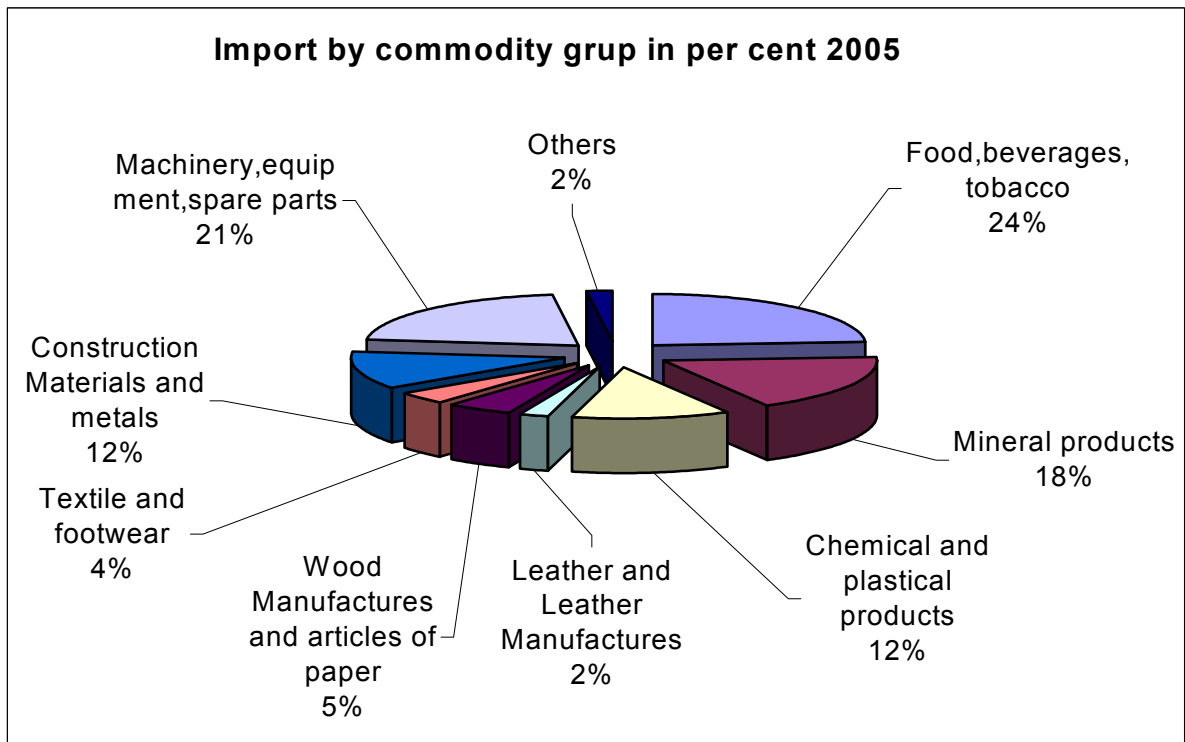

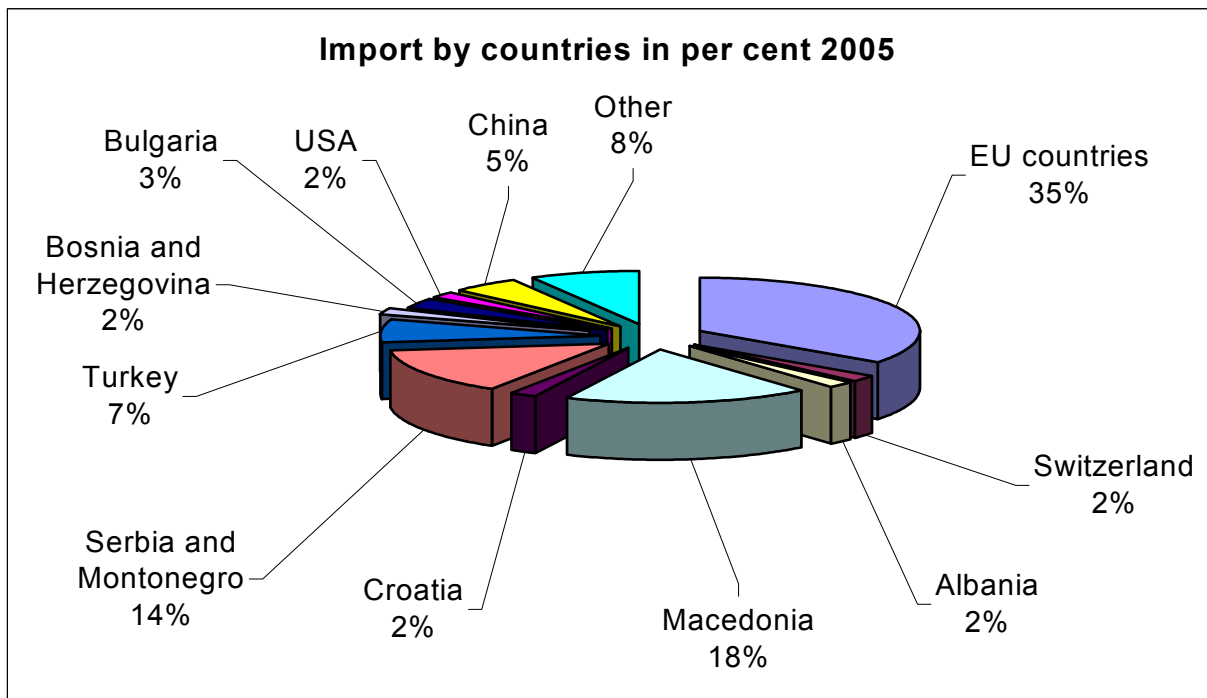

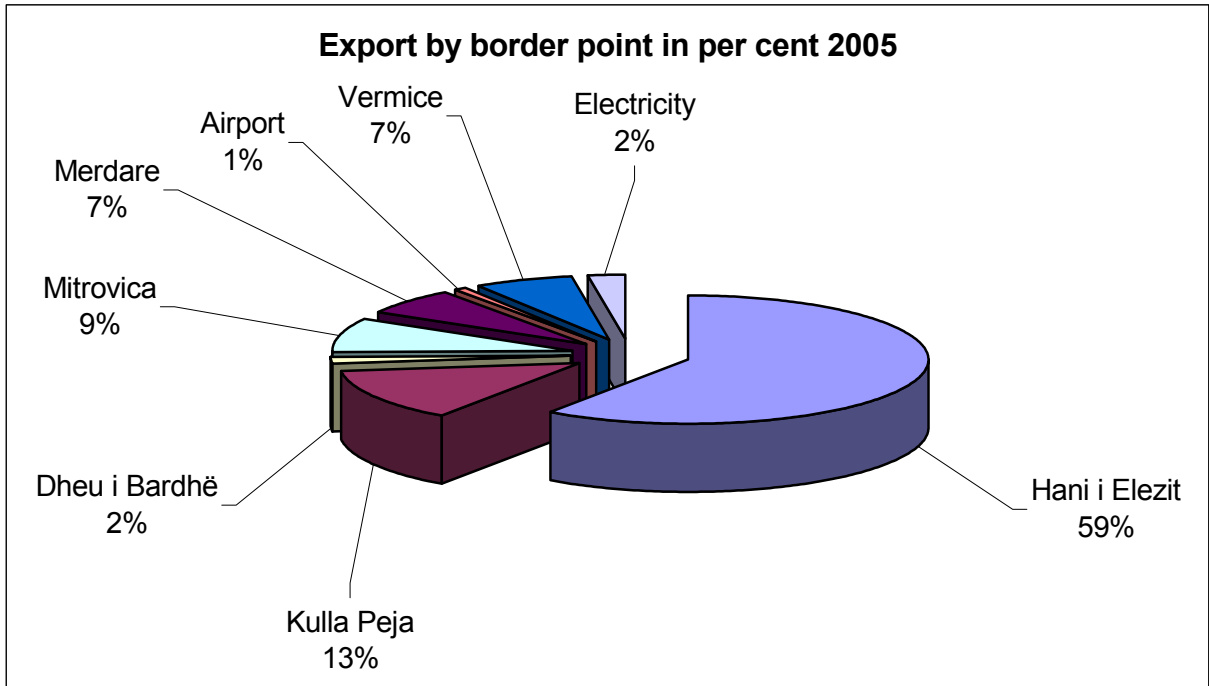

Statistical Office of Kosovo (SOK) - a brief description

The Statistical Office as a professional office has been in operation since 1948, and has passed through all the historic phases of Kosovo. On August 2nd 1999 the Office restarted its work as an independent and professional institution of public administration of Kosovo. Kosovo Consolidated Budget and various donors for particular projects finance the Office.

A Statistical Regulation (Regulation 2001/14) came into force 2 July 2001. SOK is an executive agency attached to the Ministry of Public Services (MPS). A Master Plan (medium term development plan) for the statistical system in Kosovo has been produced.

Organization structure: Seven Regional Offices (Pristine, Peja, Gjakova, Prizren, Ferizaj, Gjilan and Mitrovica) and Head Quarters in Prishtina have at present a total of 137 employees, 90 at HQ and 47 at the Regional Offices. There is 1 Long Term Consultant from Statistics Sweden, financed by Sida and 1 Project Coordinator, Statistics Sweden Projects, SOK. The Office has a fully-fledged field organization for surveys with experienced enumerators and sufficient transport. Local and international expert group are working in the population census project.

The Office Mission is to fulfill the needs of users for objective statistical data and analyses in order to support government departments and provide proper information for decision-makers and other users in Kosovo.

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
